Why are "Controlled Kerf" Logs so Important?

Approximately 10 years ago, Hochstetler Log Homes discovered a method that would help control checking in logs by "kerfing." This was done in response to clients wondering if anything could be done to eliminate, or at least minimize, the cracks that appeared in the logs. Thus inspiring Hochstetler to find a solution.

Checks are a naturally-occurring phenomenon when wood dries out and shrinks. As the cell walls dry, their thickness decreases, initiating mechanical forces to occur and causing drying stress. These forces build up until a crack (check) develops, thus relieving the stress. Checks can NOT be completely eliminated in solid logs, but can be minimized in several ways. Air-drying logs, which gradually removes moisture from the log, and then finishing with kiln-drying, helps. Don't go with the myth that using green logs will eliminate checks, for logs will dry even once installed.

Hochstetler introduced another idea. The idea to "Kerf" cut logs is based on the same principal as concrete control (expansion) joints. If concrete isn't cut within 24 hours after pouring, it will create its own "stress" cracks, resulting in cracks all over. Similar to the control joint cut in new concrete, the kerf in logs is created by making a cut 1" deep by 1/8" wide through the bottom of the stacking log, thus forcing most of the checks to occur on the same side of the kerf. The result is less checking on the visible faces of the log.

Log Homes are more Environmentally Friendly. Wood is both recyclable and renewable. Not so with steel, concrete, drywall and most other building components. While steel is recyclable it is not renewable. When the iron-ore leaves the mine that natural resource is gone forever. And what's more, it takes many times more energy to manufacture steel into a usable product than wood! For one, it takes a huge amount of energy to melt and roll or cast it into something usable such as steel studs and I-beams. Even recycling steel, while a good thing, leaves a huge carbon footprint in the re-melting process. On the other hand, very little energy is needed in manufacturing wood components.

Unlike wood, concrete and drywall aren't renewable and are virtually not recyclable. So, if you are concerned about your environmental foot print, use wood. A solid wood home can be built with zero carbon effect. However, most important of all is the fact that as trees grow they take carbon dioxide out of the air and return oxygen back into the air! Not until the tree is mature does that cycle stop. This makes it not only desirable but important that

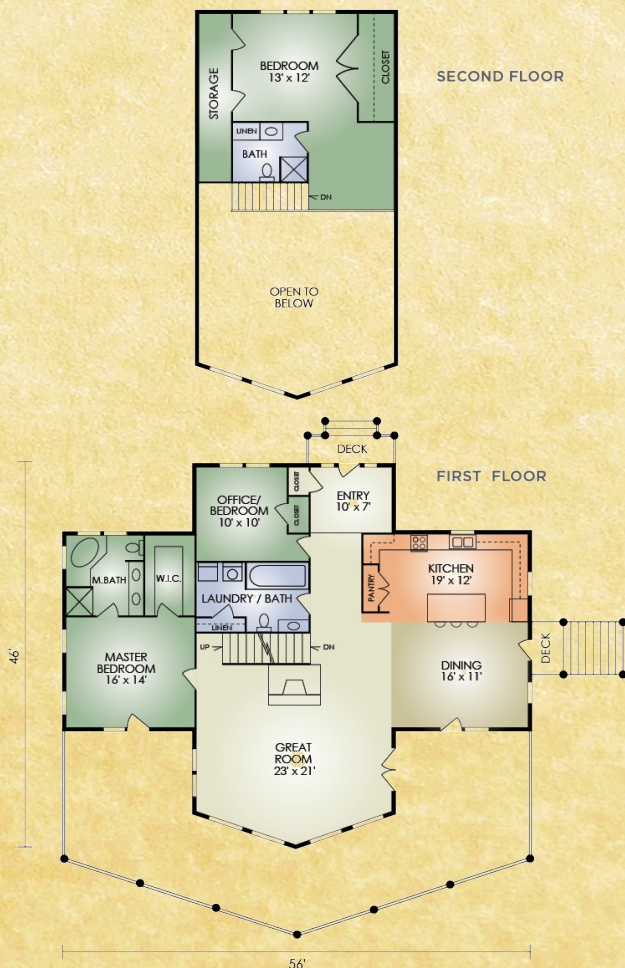

A new in-line machine was set-up in 2019 to produce this kerf cut, without having to add another operator.

In addition to reducing checking, this also helps with the performance of stain on the exterior. Our new office is constructed with control "Kerf" cut logs and they are noticeably straighter with minimal checking. 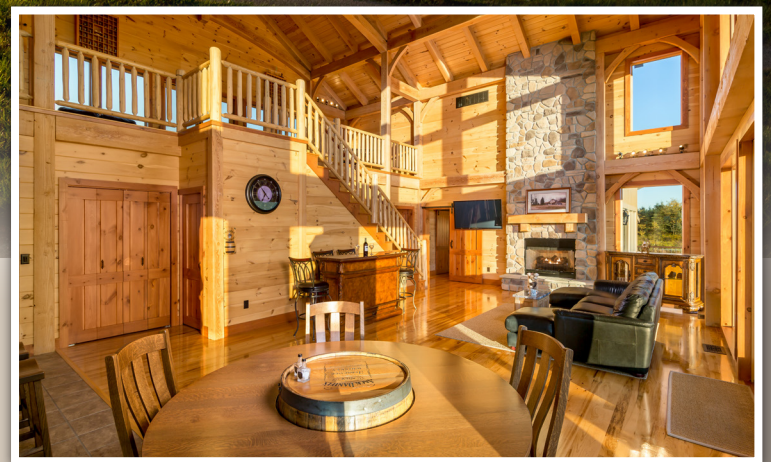

we harvest these older trees so that new younger trees have room to start the cycle all over again. Think filters, young trees work as air filters cleaning our air but once they become mature the filter gets clogged, and not only that, they release the carbons back into the air as they decay. Jad Daley, president of American Forests and co-chair of the Forest-Climate Working Group wrote that in 2019, wood products contributed 103 million metric tons CO₂e to carbon sequestration from U.S. forests – about 14 percent of our total carbon sink. This is equal to the emissions of more than 21 million cars! In other words, you can feel good about consuming wood because it actually benefits the environment helping the forest replenish our clean air.

Then the question might be, aren't we going to run out of trees? R. Bruce Hoadley writes in his book "Understanding Wood," fire, insects and decay consume as much timber as man. With better forest management we can be confident we will never run out of wood. In 1952 there was an estimated 5.4 million acres of forest land here in the state of Ohio. Currently there is an estimated 8 million acres of forest - a net gain of over 48%! I'm happy to say, according to the ODNR, that even today the forest here in Ohio is growing faster than what's being harvested.

Log Homes allow you to see what needs to be maintained. All homes, including brick homes, need to be maintained. However, homes built with natural material, such as log homes, are generally looked on as having more maintenance than some types of homes such as vinyl sided homes. However, with everything considered there is not much difference. For one, on the inside there is less painting, just like furniture the finish stays good indefinitely. Outside, a log home is far less likely to get damaged with high winds during storms. Most important, though, is the fact that with a log home you can see the first drip of water leakage, whereas in a stick home it can be leaking behind the drywall, and causing decay for years before being detected.

Log homes have fewer insects. In spite of conventional wisdom, that statement is true, providing the log home is designed and built right. The biggest reason is because there are no cavities in solid log walls for insects to nest in as there is in a 2x stick home. So why do log homes have the reputation of being more prone to insects? It probably stems from the stories of the old days when the logs were literally set on the ground or at best with inadequate stone foundations. This provided the perfect home for numerous insects including termites. Another reason may be that on the day the first ant crawls into your log home you will be able to see them, whereas in a stick home there can be a large colony of ants hidden inside the cavity behind the siding for years before you finally discover them. Not to mention a host of other insects and critters, including mice, who love to live there and raise their families.

In conclusion. There are many advantages in owning a log home. In fact there are many more than what are listed, these are only a few of the main ones. Is there more maintenance? Yes, maybe. But so it is with anything else of value. There are so many delights in owning a log home that far out outweigh the disadvantages. So I will close with this last most important element in owning a log home.

Log homes leave a legacy. Leon and his wife Evelyn had a log home built in northern Michigan in 2016. Today they, three children with their spouses, nine grandchildren and one great grandchild, as well as many friends, enjoy the fruits of their labor. Besides coming together for birthdays and other memory experiencing events they have started a "family tradition" of having the family and extended family "gather at the cabin" every year during the 4th of July and Labor Day weekend. The desire is that many years from now, long after Leon and Evelyn have moved on, the close-knit family, which will be much larger then, will continue to enjoy the fruits of their labor and "gather at the cabin." “Northwoods Special”

As a youngster, I often thought of going up to Canada on a fishing trip some day, but the reality was it didn't seem possible since our family had little extra spending money and just paying the rent and buying groceries was a challenge. But occasionally I'd pick up an old copy of Sports Afield or Field and Stream and my dream would resurface. There were photos of 30 lb. Lake Trout, succulent Walleyes, and knuckle-bustin' Northern Pike and Muskie reaching from belt to toe. That had to put a bend in the old fiberglass rod I surmised.

At age 15, I joined the Boy Scouts and my life changed forever! Our Scoutmaster, Bob, noticing our enthusiasm for fishing asked a local fisherman to come and talk to us about going to a small fishing camp on Crow Lake in Ontario. He described the Bluegills as “big as his hand.” Not exactly what I wanted to hear, but he did mention there were also bass and pike in the lake. Since we had limited funds Bob said we could possibly raise the money by collecting newspapers and selling them to the recycling center. Bob had an old trailer bed for starters, but we would need to add railing to the sides and get it safe for the road. Each Saturday we would run our route and stack papers 'till they reached the top rails. Then we would go to the collection place, drive onto the scales, get weighed, empty the papers and drive the vehicle back over the scales. The difference was the total weight of the papers and the profit was then figured. One day, when Bob wasn't looking, one of the boys climbed into the vehicle and we covered him with papers to add a little more weight! We worked every Saturday, all summer, and finally had enough money for the much anticipated trip. Meanwhile, each kid was trying to assemble the necessary gear to catch that fish of a lifetime. Bob's fisherman friend had told us to get steel leaders for the pike since their razor sharp teeth would slice through nylon line. “And, don't forget to buy a couple Dardevle lures,” he advised. These red and white striped spoons were the “go to” lures for the serious pike fisherman and have probably caught more trophies than any other lure. I even invested my “lawn mower savings” in a Pflueger Summit baitcasting reel, a significant upgrade from my cane pole! (I had spotted this reel months earlier in a Sears catalog and even folded the edge of the page as a constant reminder).

Early one August morning we headed north in Bob's green '49 Mercury stationwagon and only stopped a couple times for gas and at fruit stands for quick snacks. Food was the last thing on our minds! After checking into camp my buddy, James, and me headed down the lake to a sheltered cove, full of lily pads. I tied on the “never-fails” Dardevle spoon and began casting in all directions. Suddenly, I had a sharp tug and I reared back with my rod. A second later a fish rocketed out of the water and splashed down in an impressive spray of water. But it wasn't a pike...or a walleye...or even a muskie - it was a LARGEMOUTH bass. Nonetheless, it was eatin' size so I put it on the stringer. As we continued casting without any luck I noticed there were large bullfrogs sitting on top of the lily pads. I wondered if they would strike our lures. I tied on a small bass plug and we carefully oared over to the nearest frog. I dangled the lure about 6" in front of him and he lunged for it, impaling himself on the treble hooks as he frantically thrashed in the water. I'd heard of gigging for frogs but never fishing for them! We approached each frog the same way, and soon realized these amphibians were not at the top of the food chain...or any chain, for that matter.

As we placed each frog on the stringer, I began visualizing a scrumptious northwoods dinner... Twelve golden brown frog legs with maple-flavored brown beans and cinnamon-flavored applesauce. Yum! As the sun slowly descended behind the towering pines to the west, our day on the water was about to end but was just getting started as we prepared our “Northwoods Special.”
