We continue to give away and plant white pine seedlings. Several years ago we came up with a tree planting program. If you own several acres that you would like to plant into trees and are within 50 miles of our shop we give you the seedlings free of charge with only one string attached: you plant them. If you're more than 50 miles away you can still buy the seedlings through us in order to get a volume discount. We have a tree planter that we rent out for a nominal cost. It takes about two hours to plant one acre of about 700 trees. Naturally our resources are limited. Our minimum goal is to replace the trees we use in manufacturing log homes. We have already satisfied our 2025 goal. We still have a few opening for 2026. So far we have either planted or given away over 130,000 seedlings. If every tree would grow to maturity that would be enough to build 1500 log homes! Contact Steven at extension 209 for more information.

Braving the Storm

Hochstetler Log Home offers protection during a tornado in upstate New York

When you design and build a log home in the foothills of New York's Adirondack mountains, you think about heat sources, frost levels and snow loads, but tornados just aren't top of mind.

Unfortunately, on July 16, an EF 1 tornado struck Jack Clark's new Hochstetler log home near the Great Sacandaga Lake. Jack's son Paul, his daughterin-law Evyn and their bulldog Letty, who were in the home at the time were able to shelter safely in the basement of the house that had just been completed in April. They heard loud bangs and cracks as 115-mileper-hour winds uprooted and broke off trees that fell or were thrown onto the cabin.



"They had a warning that a bad storm was coming," Jack says. "It lasted about five minutes."

National Weather Service confirmed seven tornadoes in the Adirondacks that day, possibly resulting from the remnants of Hurricane Beryl.

Surveying the Damage

In the aftermath, Jack and his fellow homeowners discovered damage that leapfrogged around the area. Trees had penetrated the roof of his log home in several areas, torn window screens, crushed one dormer and destroyed the exterior heat pump unit.

Jack owns a cottage across the street from the cabin on the lakefront. "That property was virtually untouched," he says. Meanwhile, a neighbor's boat and dock were wrenched out of the water and dropped on a neighbor's car.



Help on the Way

Downed trees and wires knocked out power to the log home. The new 1,000-gallon gas generator kicked on but only ran for about an hour before failing, leaving Jack's son and daughter-in-law without electricity or a way to pump water from the well. They hiked down the road, dodging downed power lines, to a spot where Jack could retrieve them.

Almost immediately, Jack was able to secure a large crew with heavy equipment to begin clearing trees. Robert Mack, who had just been on the property to stack the home's logs during construction returned to the site to make a list of materials needed to rebuild. The Hochstetler team is now working on supplying roof shingles, tongue-and-groove and other replacement materials. Through it all, the home's structural logs remained intact.

Weather Resistance

Steve Lykins, an engineer at Hochstetler Log Homes wasn't surprised that in general, the Clarks' home fared well. "In the 15 years I've been at Hochstetlers, this is the third home that's been hit by a derecho or a tornado," he says. "In every instance, the damage to the roof has been the same, but I've never seen timbers broken." Log walls, he estimates, should be able to withstand head-on winds of 200 miles per hour. "Jack's house didn't go anywhere, and that's our goal. Our goal in design is to protect life and safety." Overall, Steve says, log homes have proven to be resistant to fire, wind and hail.

It was fortunate, Jack says, that the gutters hadn't been installed yet and they hadn't landscaped the log home. Otherwise, all of that would have been destroyed.

Like many people who own a lake house, Jack's family enjoys watching storms roll in across the water. "This," he says, "was not one of those thunderstorms that you watch and enjoy."



Auction will be held on Friday. 

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

ear Creek Lodge, the log home John and Cheri Sloane built in Stahlstown, Pennsylvania, got its name from a serendipitous bear encounter and its style from rustic lodges in the region.

The lodge style came first. The Sloanes, who had dreamed for years of a log home, often vacationed in this part of Pennsylvania, spending time at local resorts in both the summer and winter. "We wanted the home to feel like a resort; like you were at a vacation destination," John says.

With that vision in mind, they needed to find land. They met a real estate agent at a log home show in the area who gave them directions to an 11-acre lot for sale. "We drove to it and it was exactly what we were looking for," John recalls. The wooded site featured ponds, a stream and plenty of space for their family and friends to get that resort feeling.

From Dream to Reality

The Sloanes met Hochstetler Log Homes at the same show. "We went out to Hochstetler to look at plans. They were so friendly, nice and accommodating. It felt like a collaboration," John says. "There was never any doubt that was who we'd work with."

They brought designer Steve Hochstetler blueprint ideas and magazine photos, and the couple discussed with him what they wanted and didn't want. "He sent us a plan that was just about perfect right off the bat."

The home's lodge style starts right at the front door, which is protected by a porte cochere reminiscent of the grand entrances to park lodges. Interior beams and large, 8-by-12-inch square logs with bands of chinking and hand-hewn texture add to the rustic look. "We liked the feel of how heavy and large the logs were," John says.

Like every iconic mountain lodge, the Sloanes' home is anchored by an attention-grabbing stone fireplace. "We wanted to make sure to have as big a fireplace and as big a great room as we could get." Steve's plan for the 3,000-square-foot main floor minimized hallways and





emphasized the open and spacious kitchen, dining room and great room area.

The main floor also includes three bedrooms: The primary suite, a bedroom for their animal-loving daughter and one for their son with a loft that has a secret entrance.

Room for All the Fun

The great room and kitchen may be Cheri's favorite places in the house, but she and John outfitted the lower level for active entertaining. A family room with a fireplace on that level offers comfortable seating. There's also a home theater, kitchen, bar and a mudroom that doubles as a gym. The kids and their friends are never bored with a fully outfitted arcade with shuffleboard, air hockey and video games.

A guest bedroom is also located on this level, along with a hockey-themed bunkroom that sleeps nine. "My son plays and we knew we'd be entertaining hockey kids," John says.

The Great Outdoors

"There are a ton of different places to sit outside," John says. Decks, a gazebo and porches all have a different feel: The big deck on the back of the home is a favorite for watching the sun set behind the mountains.

One of the outbuildings, which resembles a barn, accommodates a large indoor pool. "It's log siding on the outside," John says, "and inside it has steel panels that are water resistant." If the weather's good, the pond is swimmable, too. Next to the pond,

John and his dad built a pavilion from leftover timbers. The pond's dock is a favorite spot for John. "I like to sit on the dock, have a fire and fish next to the fire while looking at the cabin."

About That Bear

The story of the Bear Creek Lodge goes like this: There's a creek on the property and plenty of bear activity in the area. My Second Home

As my fishing buddy and I drove north on Rt. 75 toward our destination in Canada, it suddenly occurred to me that this might be my last visit to "my second home."

When I was a youngster growing up on the south side of Akron, it always seemed like a dream to go on a fishing trip there. I read and saw photos of Northern Pike and Muskies nearly as tall as I was and was fascinated by the stories in *Field & Stream* and *Sports Afield*. Authors like Ted Trueblood and Jason Lucas made those stories "come alive." But it wasn't until I saw the huge pike that some men in our neighborhood brought back from Canada that I knew someday, somehow, I had to go there.

My first trip was as a member of the Boy Scouts when we went to Crow Lake, Ontario, and stayed in a small log cabin. One of the scouts discovered we could catch pike by trolling a spinnerbait over the weeds where they were hiding. Years later, when I started college, a fraternity brother and I would make an annual trip to an island on Lake Kapiskong, in northern




Ontario. Dave would bring his 9.9 Johnson motor, and we would rent an old wooden boat and off we'd go to a deserted island where we'd camp and fish and soak up the beauty of the great outdoors. The lake had mostly walleye and large pike. One day, as we were anchored, I set the hook on what I thought was a nice walleye. It tugged, straight down as walleyes do, and my rod doubled over the side of the boat. "Get the net!" I shouted, and Dave quickly grabbed it. A minute later it surfaced, but not what I expected. It was a trophy all right...a trophy sucker!

This year, another fishing buddy and I decided to go to an area I'd never been to, but had heard about: the French River. It is well known for producing a great variety of fish — walleye, northern pike, smallmouth and largemouth bass, plus huge muskies (a record 69-lb-er was caught in adjoining Georgian Bay years ago). We stayed at an old fishing camp on the nearby Pickerel River, hoping to catch a large muskie or pike. My buddy, Mike, fished mostly for pike and muskie while I cast to the shoreline for bass. He caught a few small pike, "hammerhandles," in weeds over deeper water and I caught some nice bass probing the rocky shoreline. Typically, you use wire leaders when fishing for pike or muskie because of their sharp teeth, but I was not equipped for that since I was fishing for bass. Anyway, I set the hook on a good fish and shortly felt several strong tugs. I thought I had a nice bass but it didn't jump out of the water like they usually do. In our little "tug of war" he wasn't giving an inch and suddenly dove under the boat, snapping my line. I'm not sure what it was but I think it was a muskie or pike that bit through the line.

After a hearty breakfast each day in the lodge we would return to our cabin and make sure our rods were ready to "do battle" with these denizens of the deep. The lodge had several 4' muskies and pike adorning the walls and we were eager to ply our skills and have our own wallhanger. While Mike was tying on his favorite red and white bucktail spinner, I was rigging my rods for bass. I usually used a 5" rubber worm with a 2.0 worm hook and a small splitshot weight about 4" up the line. The splitshot has a small slit on one side which you clinch with pliers to hold onto the line. With no pliers in sight I decided to close it with my teeth while holding it in place with my tongue. I clamped down and got it. Not the line, my tongue! I tried to call Mike, "I aught my ongue an' I ant et it out!" He came in and thought I'd hooked myself.

"No-o-o, pitsot," I said, speaking as best I could. "Get iars!"

After a few suspenseful moments, he was able to pry open the splitshot and remove it. Luckily, I didn't have to go to the hospital emergency room while holding my fishing rod alongside!





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
